DOMESTIC VIOLENCE LEGISLATION

After many years of advocating for reform, Armenia finally adopted a law on domestic violence prevention on December 13, 2017. The law creates obligations for police to use urgent intervention measures to protect victims, introduces court-ordered protection orders, and mandates government-run shelters for victims and trainings for service providers. Going forward, we will continue our advocacy and capacity building work to improve service delivery and keep the state accountable to its obligations under the law. CAPACITY BUILDING

The WSC continually engages in capacity building by inviting outside professionals to train local service providers. This past autumn, we invited US-based clinical social workers Holly Aldrich and Janet Yassen for a week-long training to train social workers and psychologists at the WSC and partner organizations on trauma principles and practice.

RESEARCH AND PUBLICATIONS



This year, our staff published 5 <u>guidelines and research studies</u> that support proper domestic violence service provision and inform best practices in the field. They include:

- Standard operating procedures for social workers serving women and girls subjected to domestic violence
- Guidelines for setting up and running a women's refuge
- "The woman must satisfy, the man must be satisfied": Impact of domestic violence on women's sexual and reproductive health in Armenia
- Examining sex-selective abortion policy, practices, and rhetoric in Armenia from a rights perspective
- Gender politics in Armenia: An exploration of legislation, anti-gender rhetoric, and community strategies

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
